






Austin Thomas showing the winning entry by Wigan 10 FC in the 2013 Inter-Club PDI Championship at Warwick.

The picture on the screen is "Peter Fox" by the sadly missed Maurice Jones MPAGB ARPS 1945 – 2013



AWARDS FOR PHOTOGRAPHIC MERIT (APM)

I guess there are lots of blogs out there where people discuss their work. I like this one on Facebook, <u>https://www.facebook.com/groups/photodistinctions/</u>, where people post their pictures specifically to be advised if they are good enough, or how they might be improved to achieve PAGB distinctions. In the main, the advice given seems sensible and beneficial. Seeking advice is always a good idea but remember that, in the end, it is your choice. Some advice will be better informed than others and it is up to you what you do with it. The following is an article I recently posted in response to questions asked on the blog.

CPAGB = Good Club Photography. It isn't really surprising that prospective entrants struggle to ascertain what the PAGB thinks Good Club Photography is.

The PAGB had to put a descriptive label on the Award to give an approximate idea of the standard required to achieve but, in reality, there is no such thing as a consistent "Club Standard". The standard of photography being presented at Clubs varies enormously from club to club and even Federation to Federation. What is "Good" in one Club will not cut it in another who are operating at a higher standard.

The same thing applies to judges. All of them give up their own time and we couldn't exist without them but, obviously, some are better than others. Most are in touch with what is happening in the better Clubs - not the very best necessarily but (say) the top 50% - but some judges seldom get invited to Clubs who consistently produce good photography.

The PAGB cannot know the level of work in your Club or in your Federation nor can they know the expertise of the judges you use. The APM employ the best, highly experienced, Adjudicators who have judged at a great many Clubs and, in reality, they define what "Good Club Standard" is. The APM have in place a permanent team and careful briefings to ensure that this is as fair, unchanging and as consistent as is humanly possible. The Award isn't for success in your Club. If it was, we wouldn't need you to submit work to the Adjudicators.

So, if you don't belong to one of the better Clubs, how do you find out what Good Club Photography is and how you might achieve it? There are lots of things you can do....

Make the best Prints and PDIs you can and try to get them into Inter-Club Competitions and Federation Competitions. **Be there** if the judging is in public. See PAGB, Federation, BPE and International Exhibitions **whenever you can** - much of the work will be of a higher level but you should be aiming high!

Form a self help group - people who are interested in the APM and who will help and encourage each other. You might find local "experts" who will help advise the group. You can learn as much from hearing how other people can improve their photos as you can discussing your own.

Get your **Club to hire** one or more of the CDs on the subject from the PAGB RLS. These contain hundreds of pictures at the correct standard. Yes hundreds!

Encourage your Federation to run **APM Workshops** and don't miss them when they happen. The PAGB will support these, paying travelling costs for some of the APM team to attend. Usually workshops will involve expert opinion 1:1 on the pics you bring. Some Clubs have run workshops themselves - the PAGB can send experts but cannot afford to pay their expenses for Club events.

Look for a mentor. The L&CPU and N&EMPF have organised schemes which other Federations do not but there is still likely to be someone in your vicinity who can help you. If possible, ask someone who has acted as an APM Adjudicator or has **at least** been recently successful themselves at CPAGB or DPAGB. Don't expect them to choose your entry for you but listen to their advice and then make up your own mind.

Attend an **Adjudication even if it involves a long journey to see for yourself** what passes and what fails. Talk to entrants at the event and find out what advice they obtained.

Watch out for more information in **e-news**. We hope eventually to compile a list of possible qualified mentors and lecturers who will talk about the APM.

You will get to see interesting pictures and make a few people very happy. (You will always have the choice to refuse or accept a "mentoree".).

Who does, or could do a lecture about the APM? It would be nice to list you too and eventually have you listed in the Handbook.

The PAGB will support Mentors and Lecturers with information and photographs on a CD and you can maybe collect a few prints from local successful entrants.

PAGB APM – PROBLEMS WITH LATE WITHDRAWALS

Why I get a little grumpy over late withdrawals from an APM Adjudication

(Editor. I have never known our President to be grumpy.)

Well, I suppose it is because we start work on each Adjudication around 2 years prior and I see all the hard work that both the PAGB team and the host Federation put in trying to make it a success in the run up to the Adjudication itself. Federations only host every 7-8 years and it can be a lot of work and a very steep learning curve to make sure they do not let themselves down. So it is frustrating when the Adjudication ends up running at less than full capacity with consequent loss of revenue to cover the costs and photographers being denied the chance to take part.

It is, of course, inevitable that we will have withdrawals – on average it is seven every Adjudication. Around half of these withdraw in good time and I am able to fill the vacated place. The other half delay contacting the Reception Secretary until the very last moment before pulling out ,far too late to fill their space.

As a recent example two print entrants failed to submit their entry forms and CD by the closing date. I sent an email reminder to both extending the deadline by three days - no response. When the new deadline had passed I sent another email and, the day after, two replies both saying "too busy to enter". Having been entered for over a year they did not have time to prepare ten, fifteen or twenty prints maximum (depending upon the level they entered) – I only wish I was that busy not to be able to handle that workload!

This was capped by a PDI worker who submitted a single entry form, (we require two) and CD ten days <u>after</u> the closing date. Insufficient postage was attached (which the Reception Secretary had to pay). The entrant was apparently surprised that his entry had already been cancelled. Oh, and it transpired his CD had been incorrectly prepared and would have been sent back to him anyway. Around 50% of all the CD's submitted do not meet the PAGB APM specific requirements (wrong size, incorrect colour space, etc.) and they have to be sent back as we cannot permit anyone to make any corrections even if the author has given permission.

So when is "late?" Some seem to think that withdrawal merely involves me in drawing a line through their name on the Entrants list and problem solved.

I suppose it is understandable that they have no idea of the work behind the scenes but the Entry packs are issued over three months in advance and entrants only need to submit their Entry forms and CD (for prints these are used for projection to the audience etc) approximately five weeks before the event. We really need this time so that the scoring database is populated and verified, and all other physical checking can be done. A CD/DVD of all the entries at each level must be prepared for both Prints and PDI and this has to be with the PAGB Projection team at least two weeks in advance to ensure everything will be correctly projected. So any withdrawal on, or after, the closing date means that we cannot fill the vacancy - even, though we have people willing to do so. Remember that all this is completed by a willing team of volunteers who have to fit these jobs in between all the other things they do.

My concerns may reduce in the future. Tougher withdrawal Rules will soon apply and I urge anyone entering to download the new leaflet from the PAGB Website – you have been warned!

In the meantime, if I am visiting your Federation/Club and seem a little grumpy it may be because it's "that time of the Year" Leo Rich, Awards Secretary

From November 2014, anyone withdrawing from the event after their initial acknowledgement letter but more than 13 weeks from the date of their Adjudication specified in the letter, will have their fee refunded less a £25.00 Administration charge. Anyone withdrawing later than 13 weeks from the date of their Adjudication will forfeit their entire fee.

In either case, should the Applicant wish to take part in a future Adjudication they will need to complete a new Application Form, including the Certificate of Qualification by their Federation Awards Officer, and, of course, the full fee, not the re-submission fee, will have to be paid.
