

The page is already available to visit, but currently has only a few clubs registered. If you do not want your club to appear, you can either not provide the postcode, or delete it, if it already exists.

It was an honour to have one of my pictures chosen for the Masters of Print exhibition again this year and I was very proud to see it professionally mounted amongst all the other excellent images on display at St Martin in the Bull Ring. I was also delighted to receive a Luxury Print Mounting Kit from Paper Spectrum by Chris Roberts, the Managing Director, who chose my image from the exhibition.

I joined Poulton Photographic Society in 2011 after accidentally drowning my camera, while photographing hammerhead sharks in Cocos island, which forced me to upgrade to a decent DSLR and, in the process, to start taking a greater interest in all aspects of photography.




These days, I spend a lot of time in and around the edges of Morecambe Bay, near where we live, trying to capture unique moments of the wildlife.

Studying the wading birds, seeing how they interact with the weather and tides, gives you a sense of where to position yourself, in the hopes of capturing a decent image. I had been sitting amongst the rocks, on the edge of the salt marsh, for about an hour before this Egret arrived and it

was another 20 minutes before it took off and I got the picture. These moments and opportunities are rare and, in order to remain competitive within our club, my wife and I sometimes create set-ups with some of the more common garden birds.

But true wildlife images, either underwater or on land, are what I really enjoy taking and experiencing and so I was particularly happy that the image chosen for the Masters of Print was this one, maybe justifying the insanity of spending hours sitting in a muddy ditch!

#### AWARDS FOR PHOTOGRAPHIC MERIT ADVICE

Once again the PAGB will be offering Awards for Photographic Meri1:1 Advisory Sessions on our stand at The Photography Show.

We will have several Adjudicators in attendance each day to discuss any work you wish to bring along – Print or PDI – and, if you take their advice, this will give you a much better chance of success

For an appointment, please e-mail <a href="mailto:rod@creative-camera.co.uk">rod@creative-camera.co.uk</a> with all of the following information please.

- 1 What day are you coming?
- 2 Do you want a morning or afternoon appointment?
- 3 What level are you interested in CPAGB, DPAGB or MPAGB?
- 4 Are you intending to apply in Print or PDI?
- 5 Will you bring Print or PDI for us to look at?
- 6 Have you applied, or have you been accepted to an Adjudication?
- 7 Which Club & Federation are you a member of?

You can bring unmounted Prints, even at A4, but we will not be able to store them on our stand. Left luggage facilities are available in the NEC. Bring your PDI on a stick. Please do not bring too many pictures. A maximum of 15 for CPAGB, 20 for DPAGB and 30 for MPAGB please.

We strongly advise that you bring your images in Print if you are applying in Print, otherwise our advice can only speak to the content and not the quality of the print.

Bring your PDI, preferably not larger than H1600px x V1200px, on a stick. We will probably be viewing them on a Mac laptop. If you bring them on a tablet or a phone, we can only speak to the content and not the quality of the image when it is projected.

### **Success** with Adrian Lines

Along with my real job, my photography, my committee and software work for the PAGB and my own federation, I also have a small software development company called Datascribe Ltd. Under this banner I am promoting a couple of new websites I have developed to help both **Photography Exhibition Entrants** and **Club Competition Secretaries**. Both of these projects started out for my own purposes but have now grown into something that I can offer to the wider world.



The Competition Image Management
System can be found at https://cimgr.com

The first project is an online 'Competition Image Management System' (CIMGR), designed to simplify record keeping for National and International Exhibitions.

It allows users to upload digital versions of their images and then allocate them to the various exhibitions and competitions, entering the relevant scores and awards as they are received. The system can then provide image activity reports along with organisation specific target reports, for BPE, FIAP and PSA.

We already have around 50 active members, but we have space for plenty more. To register, just visit the website and click on the 'Register New Account' button.

This service is completely free and is funded by sponsorship and advertising


The second project is an online 'Club Competition Entry System' (SuCCESs), designed to allow clubs to manage entries to their competitions.

Club Competition Secretaries can create a primary club account and then publish their competitions. Club members can then upload their images and titles to the website. When ready, the Competition Secretary can download the images, formatted for whatever system they use on the night. The system works particularly well with Dicentra.

After the competition, Club Competition Secretaries can then re-upload the scores to the system and use it to send out results to their members. This system removes the need for USB dongles, CDs and emailed images and it can check dimensions and can automatically produce the correct naming formats, saving the competition organiser time and effort.

This facility is also free, if no charges are made to the entrants. (Such as a Salon or Exhibition). This service is funded by sponsorship, advertisers and organisations charging entry.

To register either a primary club account, or club member account, just visit the website and click on the relevant link.

All photographs from workshops and set-ups, studio, landscape, model-shoots, nature and re-enactments, are unfair and should not be allowed in competitions!

Well, I have seen quite a number of online discussion and I have received numerous communications over the years from people who believe this. Equally, I have heard from many people who believe that judges are biased against such shots and punish them with low marks. So, who is right, or is everyone wrong?

It is undoubtedly true that there are workshops and set-ups where there the pictures can be captured without much input from the photographer. There are studio workshops where the model does all the work, the lights are set up for you and you only need to press the trigger. There are nature hides where the creatures are baited in and you simply "machine gun" them – shoot enough frames and you must get one good shot.

However, most workshops are not like this and, even when they are, it is noticeable that the more skilled photographers usually seem to get the best shots. I have been involved in helping on phototravel trips for many years and, whilst I am ready to help when it is needed and I encourage ordinary people to pose for us, it is unusual for two people to get the same shot – even when they are sitting on my shoulder! Everyone brings their own skill set and their own creative instincts, and their shot has their own personal twist.

"Pay and Display" nature has become a big market with photographic opportunities all over the world. Even so, how many really good nature photographers are there? It is nearly always the familiar names, the people with skill and a creative eye, who come to the top when there are awards to be presented. Even where creatures are baited or encouraged to appear, it still takes a degree of skill to capture the perfect moment.



I recently attended a model workshop, organised by Graham Currey and Emma Finch. They provided a superb venue, Leigh Spinners in Wigan, and 8 fabulous models working on eight sets, but they certainly did not set up the photographs. Over a weekend, 84 photographers worked in teams of 3, organising their studio lights themselves, finding daylight locations around the building and taking turns to direct the models. With Jack Cutler as Charlie Chaplin, Retro Rob, Natasha Bella, Katie Nicholas, Lydia Francis, Eva Serration & gymnast Damian Senior, it was action packed, fun filled and full on. Many of the participants brought their

own props, costumes and story boards and there is no doubt who was in control of the photography. As Emma said " "We provide the ingredients, but the photographers bake the cake".

Perhaps the most important thing to remember is that we are amateur photographers doing this for FUN. We are entitled to photograph whatever we like, give or accept as much help as we like and, so

long as we were in control of the camera, we should not be barred from using these pictures in competitions, in Clubs and in other public forums.

## But judges are biased against such pictures and will mark them down if they think they have come from workshops, set ups or third party hides.

I hear this comment a lot but I believe that it mostly comes from a lack of understanding or a lack of knowledge. It is important to differentiate between different sorts of events.

In open exhibitions, BPE, FIAP, PSA, etc., the judges are actually "Selectors", not judging against a standard, but choosing a varied and interesting exhibition, conditioned by the needs of the organisers and the prospective audience. Selection to such an exhibition is obviously a clue to the standard of your work but it isn't always that clear.

Very good pictures are often rejected because the selectors have already chosen enough of that particular genre or subject. How many pictures of the same girl does any exhibition need, how many field mice, kingfishers or Victorian costumes? Equally, less meritorious pictures can be chosen to add variety to the exhibition. Often selectors will mark higher than might seem to be deserved, just to make sure that the picture gets into the exhibition. Once, when I was judging a prestigious International Exhibition, a picture came up which was different from anything we had seen up to that point. It wasn't very well produced, not as sharp as it could be and 3 might have been the button to hit. I scored 5 in the hope that it might score 11 and would be considered for the exhibition. Unfortunately, the other two selectors had the same idea and, to our embarrassment, it scored 15, which none of us had intended!

When it comes to our Awards for Photographic Merit, the situation is quite different. The photographs are not being judged against each other and there is no exhibition requirement to be considered. Each picture is assessed against the standard applied at each level. Judging is not a science and there are no

objective criteria to assess against, so these standards are difficult to precisely define. However, our Adjudicators are very experienced, carefully briefed and they are very fair. Also the PAGB has a permanent team in place to observe and ensure that our standards are maintained.

The standard required obviously varies across the levels and so must the approach to be taken by our Adjudicators.

At CPAGB, we are looking for Good Club Photography. This is quite a high standard and our Adjudicators are looking for good content and at least adequate technical skills. At this level, they will not be overly concerned with originality of subject – although, of course, that always helps.

At DPAGB, looking for exhibition standard, they will expect more interesting and more original pictures, taken and presented with good technical skills. This does not mean that they will mark down images which look as though they may have been taken at workshops but they will be looking to assess what the entrant has brought to the shot.

The MPAGB is the very best of UK amateur photography and the Adjudicators will expect to see highly proficient, technically perfect work of an interesting and original nature. It is unlikely t that the more common subjects and images will score highly enough to achieve our ultimate award unless they show a different approach and a high degree of photographer input.
