THE SALTIRE OR THE ROSE?



Your Editor has heard that there is dissatisfaction in Scotland, perhaps leading to a protest, that members of Doncaster Camera Club have contributed to the success of the Yorkshire Photographic Union in the recent PAGB Inter-Federation Annual Competition.

It is apparently felt by many that, since Doncaster still belongs to Scotland, their Camera Club should be affiliated to the PAGB by membership of the SPF, who should have first claim on their entries.

The constitution of the PAGB requires that both Federations should sign an agreement before a Club can become a member of a "foreign" Federation and the SPF have no record of such a request or agreement. It is not clear at this time if the Scottish Parliament will wish to be involved in resolving the issue but the First Minister is apparently interested.

In January 1136, during the first months of the reign of King Stephen, King David 1 crossed the border and reached Durham. He took Carlisle, Wark, Alnwick and Newcastle-upon-Tyne. On 5 February 1136, Stephen reached Durham with an imposing troop of Flemish mercenaries, and the Scottish king was obliged to negotiate. Stephen recovered Wark, Alnwick and Newcastle, but Scotland retained Carlisle and a great part of Cumberland and Lancashire, plus the town and districts of Don ceaster - Doncaster.

In 1138, David invaded the North of England again, leading to his defeat at the Battle of the Standard and the Treaty of Durham (1139) which apparently left Scotland in control of Doncaster and its area of influence. Now the largest metropolitan district in England by area

Doncaster remained Scottish hands for 21 years until Henry II appeared to reclaim the town under English rule in 1157. But experts have now found that an official pact was never signed - meaning that the South Yorkshire town still belongs to the Scots.


The Mayor of Doncaster Peter Davies said in 2012: "It's clearly in the interests of Doncaster to be in Scotland: we'll get free prescriptions, free tuition for students and free care for the elderly".

The AGM of the PAGB will be held in 8 days' time on the 9th of April by Zoom, and it will be interesting to see if this problem will be raised or discussed at that meeting.



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Masters of Print Hall of Fame

My photographic journey started with my retirement in 2003.

I had always enjoyed taking .photographs but point and shoot was as far as I had gone with it. I joined Dumfries Camera Club and attended a general photographic class at our local college where I received an HND.

My photographic interests have changed over the years, firstly mono portraiture with dark room prints when I was at college, and then digital mono portraits.

Wildlife was another phase I went through but not good enough to compete against the nature photographers of today.

In 2015 I took a break

from competition photography for a few years to research the buildings of a local Architect, Walter Newall 1782 – 1863. I photographed his buildings as they are today and published a book on the life and works of this architect, my book was printed in 2019.

This takes us up to the pandemic when, like others, I needed a project to help me get through the difficult times. I picked up on macro flower images, collated a panel, and achieved an ARPS.

I thought then that I needed to take this subject farther and went back to still life flowers trying different approaches, with freezing them in ice and using textures. As a keen gardener the subject matter was all round me, with no need to go out of my own patch. I could also work in all weathers and I have taken more pictures in the past two years than ever before in that time scale.

I have entered the Master of Prints every year since it began with no success until now. I feel honoured with my 2022 acceptance and I will continue to support prints in this way.








1.0 Presidents Report

Since the 2021 AGM we have seen a gradual return to normality in PAGB, Federation and Club meetings and events. We have been able to return to live Executive meetings, thanks in part to moving to a new venue, Warwick University Conference Centre, found for us by the General Secretary. The centre has proved to be a much better place to meet while making a large financial saving over the London venue.

Also, we have been able to run two live APM events; One in a cut down form at Smethwick PS and the second one hosted by the WCPF in Newton Abbott.

We were also able to run the Inter Club Print Championship in a cut down form at Smethwick with a live audience joined by more club members on Zoom.

The Inter Federation and Club PDI Championships were both run very successfully on zoom again with good audiences. There also seems to be a steady return to normal in club meetings.

Many clubs have opened up for live meetings with some opting for hybrid meetings with some members attending in person while others watch on one of several streaming systems. The remainder are still either meeting on Zoom or not meeting at all. Only when full live meetings are the norm again, will we be fully back to normal.

Photographers Portfolio with Narration

WHAT DO OUR ADJUDICATORS LOOK FOR IN A PHOTOGRAPH?

Most Club members can recognise a good photograph when they see it but it is impossible to define in advance what a good photograph will look like. Judging is an Art and not a Science and our response to an image can be highly subjective. Sometimes we don't even know why we have reacted positively or negatively to a photograph.

Our Adjudicators are very experienced and are chosen for their ability to assess all kinds of image fairly and as accurately against our requirement as is humanly possible. They are carefully briefed and we have in place an established review team who are able to adjust the score of any image which has been "unlucky".

None of this is very helpful to an entrant trying to understand what the is required at each APM level, so we have tried to list just some of the things that you should consider when assessing your own work.

Content. We are looking for the interesting, original, creative content to convey an idea, an emotion, a message or a purpose. The subject can be quite mundane, provided that the photographer has demonstrated an interesting approach, showing us something that we may otherwise have missed.

Composition. This is central to the attraction of an image and should bring all the visual elements together harmoniously, so as to express the purpose of the image. Effective composition immediately attracts the Adjudicators to the image and should prompt them to look where the photographer intended. Good composition will normally lead the viewer to the main point of interest. There can be primary and secondary centres of interest, and occasionally there will be no specific point to look at if the entire scene collectively serves as one focus of interest.

Impact. Our Adjudicators are not pressed to assess too quickly but the immediate impression is still important. Images with impact can instantly evoke laughter, sadness, anger, pride, admiration or wonder.

Lighting. The use and control of light is the essence of photography and critical in APM entries., Our Adjudicators will look for the effective use of light, natural or manmade, to add excitement to a photograph, enhancing its story telling and impact

Story Telling. We are not looking for a "big" story, simply how the image communicates with the viewer to help them understand why it was taken.

Colour Balance. Our Adjudicators will consider the use of colours and tones in an image. An image in which the tones work together, effectively supporting the image, can enhance harmony. Of course, a lack of harmony can be used for effect, to evoke negative feelings

Technique. This is the approach used to create the image. Does it show effective input and choice by the photographer, in view point, lens chosen, focus and other camera settings? In other competitions where the image has done well, did the prize go to the photographer or to the subject? What did the photographer bring to the image beyond pressing the shutter release? Effective use of focus, tone and contrast can greatly enhance an image, giving it depth, with a more 3 dimensional quality.

Delivery. All of the above are the most decisive factors, but the APM also require a degree of skill in processing and printing - appropriate to the level applied for. At CPAGB this should demonstrate competence but minor errors or deficiencies may be overlooked if the image meets the other criteria. Processing, printing and presentation should be excellent for a successful DPAGB entry and at MPAGB should be extremely proficient, approaching perfection with no detectable faults.

VIOLENCE OR VIOLENT BEHAVIOUR IN NATURE

It is to be proposed that the PAGB Nature Eligibility Criteria should be amended to prevent scenes of violence and violent behaviour being entered into PAGB competitions. This restriction will apply

to all images which illustrate killing, gory feeding and other nasty behaviour including, for example Osprey, Sea Eagles or Kingfishers catching fish, raptors of any kind feeding on corpses and big cats hunting and feeding on other animals. Physical challenges and fights, even in play, will also be forbidden.

Consideration is also being given to excluding, in due course, images of sharks, crocodiles or other creatures attacking humans.

It is understood that such subjects are very popular with certain types of photographer and, to give time for such club members to wean themselves off nature images of this nature, this new criteria, if adopted, will not come into effect before the First of April 2023, 12 months from this announcement.

Extract from the current criteria which can be read in full at

NATURE ELIGIBILITY IN PAGB COMPETITIONS

Nature means Images where living organisms are the primary subject matter. The story telling value of an Image will normally be weighed more than the pictorial quality.

Nature includes:

• Images taken with subjects in controlled conditions such as zoos, game parks, botanic gardens, aquariums and enclosures where the subjects are dependent on man for food. Scientific bands, tags or collars are permissible.

Nature excludes:

- Images where the subjects are obviously domestic animals or plants.
- Images where an obviously artistic treatment has been applied

At that time we may approach other bodies, such as the RPS, FIAP and PSA to urge them to adopt the same criteria for their competitions, exhibitions and events.

- **3.2 Subscriptions** The AGM of 2020, held in October 2020, decided that no subscription would be payable in 2021. Thus there was no subscription income.
- **3.3 Notes on the Accounts** The pandemic stopped us from undertaking many of our normal actvies in 2021 so comparisons with Budget and/or previous years are not applicable. I draw attention to the following:
- **Publicity** We planned to attend The Photography Show but decided that it would be unwise. We were contracted to bear the stand rental but it was paid by the exhibition organisers' sponsoring us.
- Executive Committee Meetings we met in person in October 2021 at Warwick University and saved a substantial sum in comparison with meetings in London. An overall surplus of £10,656 was recorded in our account and this, together with the surplus in 2020, was used to discount the 2022 Subscription.
