- Ensure your images are the correct size. For the purpose of uploading, the photos shall have a size of at least 1,920 x 1,080 pixels and a file size of no more than 22 megabytes (MB). JPEG is the only file format permitted
- The selection criteria include: the quality and creativity of the photo and how well the image matches to the contest theme

AWARDS FOR PHOTOGRAPHIC MERIT

TRIAL OF TWO NEW LEVELS

In response to demand from Individuals, Clubs and Federations, the PAGB is introducing, on a trial basis, two exciting new ways to achieve an Award for Photographic Merit.

BPAGB. The Badge Level will be assessed at exactly the same standard as the CPAGB but will require fewer images and a slightly lower passing score. (7 Prints required. Entry Fee £42)

- 1 Entry is available under the same conditions and criteria as apply to CPAGB applications.
- 2 The entries will be included in the CPAGB category, and the Adjudicators will not be told which are CPAGB entries and which are BPAGB entries. They will thus be voted on according to the same criteria against the same standard as the CPAGB.
- 3 Entry is not available to holders of the CPAGB.
- 4 The entry is 7 images. The passing score for BPAGB will be 125. The normal review procedure of near misses will apply. Entrants achieving 125 or more will be awarded a BPAGB Certificate and Badge*.

*A newly sourced badge, identical to the CPAGB but White.

EPAGB. The Excellence Level is a step up from DPAGB,assessed at exactly the same standard but with a significantlyhigher passing score.(15 Prints required. Entry Fee £90)

- 1 Application for the Excellence Award is only open to existing holders of the DPAGB in Print, PDI or AV who have held the DPAGB for at least 11 months and who are still current, active members of an affiliated Club.
- 2 The entries will be included in the DPAGB category, and the Adjudicators will not be told which are DPAGB entries and which were EPAGB entries. They will thus be voted on according to the same criteria against the same standard as the DPAGB.
- 3 No images which were used in the previously successful DPAGB entry can be used for the entry for EPAGB.
- 4 The passing score for EPAGB will be 330. The normal review procedure of near misses will apply. Entrants achieving 330 or more will be awarded a EPAGB badge*. Entrants failing to achieve 330 but achieving 300 or more will not be awarded a further DPAGB certificate and badge.

*A newly sourced badge -similar to the current DPAGB with an added "scroll"

Both new levels are NOW OPEN FOR ENTRY for the next Adjudication in November but, for this trial, only applications in Prints will be accepted.

Awards for Photographic Merit (APM)

Levels

The Awards for Photographic Merit (APM) are available to members of Clubs affiliated to the PAGB through their Federations and, for still images, are at five levels:

- Badge (BPAGB) for prints only (new in 2023)
- Credit (CPAGB)
- Distinction (DPAGB)
- Excellence (EPAGB) for prints only (new in 2023)
- Master (MPAGB)

The awards are held for life without any annual fee and holders are entitled to use the designated letters after their name.

Prospective applicants must read the relevant information leaflets about the APM system, as well as their local Federation procedures.

Applications

Applicants must first apply to their Federation for confirmation of eligibility as a currently active photographer. *Leaflet 1* sets out the conditions, durations and other detailed requirements for each level. The application procedure is available from each Federation.

Kevin Maskell FRPS, MPAGB, EFIAP/b, BPE4*.



It is with great sadness that I report the passing of Kevin Maskell FRPS, MPAGB, EFIAP/b, BPE4*.. Kevin recently passed away, at home after over 7½ years of battling with advanced prostate cancer that had spread to his spine, and right up until near the end, he religiously took a picture every day and posted it onto BlipFoto.

Many of you will remember Kevin and his wife Margery visiting your clubs and lecturing with their superb prints. Kevin was a great creative photographer using many innovative

photographer using many innovative techniques. He was also a superb wildlife photographer before the days of modern cameras that almost do it for you. His photographic journey started in the darkroom days, from large format cameras

to 35mm, and he did all his own developing and processing.

Apart from lecturing round all four corners of the nation, including one in Toronto in Canada, Kevin and Margery also judged a few national exhibitions. Kevin was a founder member of Icon, a member of Smethwick Photographic Society for many years, and a member of Focus24.

Kevin was a mechanical engineer for most of his working life until his retirement and his main hobby was photography, achieving FRPS in 2001, MPAGB in 2004, EFIAP bronze in 2007, and BPE4* in 2009.

He started blipping just before his first treatment for advanced prostate cancer in October 2015. The only days missed after that were when he was in hospital for treatment.

He personally arranged for a display of Club members photographic work in Workington Community hospital. This is much appreciated by patients and staff.

In the wider field of photography, David joined the Northern Counties Photographic Federation lists of lecturers and judges in 2009. He remains on the lecture List but is no longer on the Judges list. He and continues to judge FIAP and PSA International salons and has frequently been a selector or a judge at Northern Counties photographic events. He has also been involved in the staging of the West Cumbria Photo Group small print international exhibition from 2012 - 2018.

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- 1. All parts of any image must be produced by a photographic process.
- 2. All elements of images must be the photographer's own work.

While I agree (and I'm sure most do) with the intent of the above rules it seems they're broken so often it's become accepted to do so. So, is it time for a re-write of these, considering modern digital post processing, or for them to be more strictly enforced somehow?

The reason I ask is because, if it's acceptable to use any filter such as an 'oil paint filter' or context aware tools such as spot healing in Photoshop, then you've already broken these rules. New tools such as the neural filters in Photoshop, or one-click fixes in Luminar AI, Topaz AI, etc. are becoming commonplace too - are these compatible with the rules when an algorithm is creating most of the edit?

Moving further on, full AI image generators such as Stable Diffusion can take your images in as the source material (in line with Rule 1) and text prompts can be used to then manipulate those source images into what are essentially highly complex composites based on the authors material and direction- does this comply with Rule 2?



An example of this is given with one of the source images where you can clearly see how the original image is still used, but nearly every pixel has been changed to move the subject into a new universe, with the whole process (once setup) done in just a few minutes. Note, this could have also been done in Photoshop as a traditional composite over several days. Do we retain the rules as a above and define post processing tools that are compatible (e.g. only dodge, burn, contrast, and clone tool) and also introduce a new category of competition to allow for other types of edits where the software creates new pixels or does a significant amount of the work (brush tool, spot healing, filters, any AI tool, etc)?
