This will be in a private message and will not be on public view. He will then invite comments from selected assessors, after which the panel will vote privately again.

At the end of each session, the assessors will retire to a private break-out room for a final discussion, which will confirm the result of each application, to be announced at the end of the day.

















AWARDS FOR PHOTOGRAPHIC MERIT - 25/26 NOVEMBER ADJUDICATION


Pictures created by artificial intelligence are not allowed in salons run under FIAP patronage. Therefore salon organisers are asked to include the following text into the regulations of their events:

The exhibition will also be displayed at Wilkinson Cameras in Liverpool and Carlisle during October and November. The dates will be posted on the London Salon's website when known.





Masters of Print Hall of Fame

I was absolutely delighted to have my first acceptance into Masters of Print last year with "Polar Bear, Resting out the Storm," and to see it in the midst of such fabulous company was a joy. Imagine my excitement when the same print won the FIAP Gold Medal for the Best Wildlife in the Southampton International Exhibition a few months later. Having my prints

Southampton International Exhibition a few months later. Having my prints recognised at this level was a huge honour for me as I'm a very keen home printer, with a nerdy love of different papers.

I'm currently a member of Southampton CC, having recently moved to Dorset, but was previously President of Woking PS after joining in 2018. I'm primarily a wildlife photographer, with forays into landscape and portraits on occasions.



My wildlife photography took a distinct upward trend in 2018 on a "trip of a lifetime" to Antarctica – I've subsequently been to Finland, Iceland twice, Svalbard twice, Hungary three times and the Falkland Islands and South Georgia, so the trip of a lifetime hasn't yet been done! As you can tell, I have a love of the ice, north and south. I had a week on the Falklands before a ship voyage to South Georgia, and I totally fell in love – it's a vastly different way of planning and travelling, but the wildlife is extraordinary. I had one memorable night on Saunders Island, West Falkland, just me and a small King Penguin colony with 13 adorable chicks.

When at home, I'm a local explorer, and I'm currently finding the local sites in Dorset and Hampshire are extraordinary in their own right – the New

Forest, Cranbourne Chase, Keyhaven/Lymington, Poole Harbour and Arne to name a few. I've managed to find local barn owls, hares and hundreds of butterflies and dragonflies, which will keep me occupied for months to come.



AWARDS FOR PHOTOGRAPHIC MERIT



Tony Mulvenna dpagb efiap LRPS BPE4*

I had entered the PAGB Distinction Assessment that took place in Antrim, hosted by NIPA in November '22, applying with Prints for DPAGB. I submitted 15 prints and needed an overall score of 300 to attain the distinction.

In the lead up to the assessment day I worked hard on my prints, reviewing possibilities with Catchlight advanced members, attending a couple of Catchlight hosted information evenings and reviewing my paper selection.

On the day I went along, prints in hand, nervous but happy with my entry. As the assessment started and my first print came up, "Stripes" scoring 25, I was off to a great start. That was to be my only upbeat feeling of the day! My prints were assessed and, one after one, the scores being awarded were mostly in the teens. I couldn't believe what was happening.

My best laid plans were unravelling before my eyes. It was hard to sit through the entire judging session as I knew early that I wasn't going to make the required pass mark.

As the judging concluded I was deflated but tried to remain upbeat as there were other Catchlight members and many NIPA affiliated members who were successful on the day. I wanted to make sure I was acknowledging and congratulating those who were successful.

Straight away Ross McKelvey, who was an Adjudicator,, came over to me and asked what I was doing printing my Mono images on the type of paper I had selected. He explained that they were flat, "fifty shades of grey," and lacking any true blacks or whites. He said it would be hard for the audience to understand my scores. The PDI they were seeing were perfect, but the prints were quite different. That was a tough day, and I went home extremely disappointed, not that I had been unsuccessful but that I had made a bad mistake in paper choice and also not seeking that one final review after printing and before submission.

I had decided, even before I left Antrim, that I was going to try again in Kent at the next Adjudication in April.


I did go back to the drawing board and between the November '22 and April '23 assessments, I swapped out 7 and retained 8 of the November images. The decision to do that was based on how they had scored in November, some were my bad paper choice but others on correct paper just hadn't scored well. The replacement 7 images were drawn from a combination of tried and trusted BPE Award Winning images and some brand-new images which I believed could score well.

The other tremendous change for April was the paper choices, selected with significant input from Ross McKelvey. I had often observed Ross's print presentations at Catchlight and quite often he would bring along the same image printed on 2 different papers, an exercise to show members the difference paper choice can make to a printed image, it can either make it or break it. My first DPAGB assessment attempt was a stark reminder of how not to do it.

I travelled to Kent along with my wife for the April Assessment and, although I had been unsuccessful in attempt one, I wasn't as nervous this time as I had been in November.

I again opened with "Stripes", this time scoring 28 out of 30, which turned out to be the highest scoring print from any of the submissions that day. It was a great start, followed with 8 prints scoring 20 or higher, and I was well on my way. I was still nervous as we hit the break, halfway through the Adjudication but, upon resuming, my prints continued to score well. As we neared the latter prints, I was able to relax as once my second to last print was scored. I was already over the successful mark requirement of 300! My last print, "The Thinker" score 24 and I finished with a score of 325 and had achieved DPAGB accreditation.

I would like to acknowledge all of those who helped me on both attempts but especially Ross McKelvey and Jennifer Willis for their input on image selection and printing and a special mention to my wife who had to pick me up after the November Assessment and who accompanied me for the Adjudication in Kent. *Tony.*
