# AMAZING ADVANCES by the PAGB

You will, by now, be familiar with images created using Artificial Intelligence tools and hopefully you have read the clever article by Christine Widdall in **e-news** which you can still download at

The PAGB have published their guidance on the use of AI for competition and you can view it on our website at <a href="http://thepagb.org.uk/wp-content/uploads/guidance\_ai.pdf">http://thepagb.org.uk/wp-content/uploads/guidance\_ai.pdf</a>. What you have probably not been aware of is the exhaustive research which the PAGB has undertaken looking at the capabilities of AI in areas beyond just the creation and improvement of images.

The Executive Committee are due to consider the following interesting concepts at their next meeting.

#### 1. DO WE NEED JUDGES?

Some of you may already have taken advantage of <u>Brent's Friendly Photo Critique</u> (Click to try it). Our technology guru, Adrian, has studied this in great detail and has almost completed an improved PAGB version which will be made available through our CMS to Clubs and Federations. We are confident that this will obviate the need for human judges for many competitions and will provide a more equitable and erudite analysis of your PDI images. For obvious reasons, it may be some time before the service can be used for prints.

So as not to remove much of the fun of human judging, Adrian is building in a Complaint Portal, where AI will be able to reply to your concerns with patience, humour and sometimes pathos.

#### 2. DO WE NEED PHOTOGRAPHERS?

Club members spend an inordinate amount of time taking and processing images to supply the voracious maw of Competition, such as the GB Cup, the Club Championships and Salons. The PAGB EC will be invited to consider amending their conditions of entry so that, to take the example of the GB Cup, a Club may be required only to submit its name and the appropriate fee plus a number of descriptive key words. We would then use AI to generate the appropriate number of images which could then be judged, by AI of course, and the results published almost instantly. Surely a fairer process than relying on the enthusiasm of your members and the vagaries of human judges?

#### 3. DO WE NEED A PAGB?

There seems to be gathering evidence that the Executive Committee of the PAGB could be replaced with an Artificial Intelligence module, provided that we can factor in a modicum of pig headedness, some elements of onset dementia, an ability to discount facts which do not fit pre-conceived plans plus an overwhelming all-compassing enthusiasm to make things better for Clubs and their members. Introduction of such a system could return many thousands of leisure hours to our hundreds of unpaid volunteer workers working for you in the PAGB and its Federations. Perhaps even your Club Officers could be retired?

# Masters of Print Hall of Fame

MY PRINT CONVERSION

I was late to the printing party buying my first printer in late 2018. I had always been a bit apprehensive about printing after hearing stories that it was too expensive, (someone recommended a £1000+ printer) too difficult and too time consuming.

So what changed my mind - a moment of madness in applying for a CPAGB distinction, I wanted to use prints and since I'm the control freak from hell I wanted to produce them myself. After much research and agonising



I bought a medium quality printer with a book about printing and set off on the most exciting photographic journey I've ever been on. Its official, I am an evangelical print convert.

I can say that my photography has been improved immeasurably by learning to print, all the horrible little things that judges tend to notice (and you wish you had) become so much more apparent when a print is in your hands rather than looking on a screen.

An often overlooked advantage of printing is that the use of the right choice of paper can

elevate an image from nice to spectacular. An example is the lone tree image that I had accepted into the 2021 Masters of Print. On a normal lustre it was nice and I was pleased. However, on a fine art paper it was elevated to a portfolio shot, and one that hangs in my living room.



However the main reason I print is that it's just really fun and I love doing it. If you are debating learning to print take the plunge – you will become a convert as I was.

Jock McShoogler with his prize Haggis tup. This is probably the last photo taken of this haggis rancher on St.Kilda, before he, and all the other residents, were removed from the islands in 1930. There is no record to tell us if the Haggis were taken with them but there have been recent reports of feral Haggis sightings on the uninhabited St Kilda and elsewhere in the Western Isles.

On 29 August 1930, the 36 islanders from St Kilda were evacuated to the mainland at their own request.

The gradual loss of self-sufficiency had started in the mid-19th century when there was increasing contact with the outside world. From 1877 the SS *Dunara Castle* began regular summer cruises to St Kilda and was soon joined by others such as the SS *Hebrides*. Whalers and fishing fleets also worked in St Kildan waters and brought supplies to the islanders.

John Ross, the schoolmaster, noted in 1889 that islanders spent time producing goods to sell to tourists, including sheepskins, tweeds, knitted gloves, stockings and scarves, eggs and ornithological items.

Gradually the St Kildans began to rely more on imports of food, fuel and building materials and furnishing for their homes. In 1852, 36 people emigrated to Australia and the population decline began. The islanders felt increasingly isolated from the outside world and disliked particularly the lack of regular communications.

In 1912 there were acute food shortages and in 1913 an outbreak of influenza. The First World War brought a naval detachment to Hirta and regular deliveries of mail and food from naval supply vessels. When these services were withdrawn at the end of the war feelings of isolation increased. There was more emigration of able-bodied young islanders and a breakdown of the island economy, eventually leading to the evacuation of the remaining islanders.

A clump of honey fungus mushrooms, which I found growing on a log in a country park. I focus stacked multiple images together to capture maximum details.

This dew-encrusted individual is a blue-tailed damselfly – Ischnura elegans, whose portrait I captured using a macro lens plus a 1.4x teleconverter, to increase the magnification even further. In addition, I focus stacked multiple images together.


#### Welcome to the Pinhole Day website!

Tracey Lund has been doing wildlife photography for 24 years and e has worked alongside some amazing professional wildlife photographers. In 2019 she won the Sony World Photography Awards in the Wildlife Category and in 2021 she won the FEP Awards in the wildlife category. These are only a couple amongst other awards but these two really started to get her noticed within the photography network. When Covid hit and there was no travel, she took to zoom and started sharing her images and stories Clubs around the country to. She is now averaging around 60 talks a year and offering four different talks. As these talks took off, Tracey started to receive a lot of interest in whether she offered opportunities for people to travel with her etc. This started to build to the point she started to think 'can I do this?'.

Her full time job at the time was a Network Maintenance Engineer for the local telecommunications company in Hull. They had always supported her in her photography and in the end, they gave her an opportunity she could not miss. In October 2022 she took redundancy and left her job of 27 years to live her dream. Wild Aperture was born and last year she led eight photography tours UK & Worldwide. This year is looking just as good and she's already planning for 2025/2026. She admits that this is hard work without much financial reward but to see clients faces when they visit the wildlife and bring home great images, makes her smile.

Her most recent accolade has been winning not only a Gold in the Bird Behaviour category but the title of World's Best Nature Photographer 2024 in the World Nature Photography Awards.



I took 1800 images on that day but only had 2 that I could use.

The World Press Photo Exhibition returns to London after a seven-year hiatus. Taking place at Borough Yards, Dirty Lane, London, SE1 9AD between Friday 3rd May and Monday 27th May 2024. The World Press

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The World Press Photo's purpose is to connect the world to the stories that matter. The exhibition invites viewers to step outside of the news-cycle and think critically about important topics across the globe, whilst developing and nurturing mutual understanding, with accurate, diverse, high-quality visual stories that benefit us all.

The World Press Photo Foundation was founded in 1955, and since then its annual photo contest has showcased the best photojournalism and documentary photography of the previous year, to millions across the globe. Each year, the exhibition travels to over 60 cities, in more than 40 countries worldwide.

The London Exhibition Director, Woody Anderson, commented "In the realm of visual storytelling, World Press Photo stands at the forefront of its art, beckoning its audience into the reality inhabited by the subjects in each image. The virtuosity, and often perilous pursuit of capturing the photos, position this exhibition in the vanguard of global photojournalism. The exhibition sparks emotion, but it also kindles a collective consciousness, vividly illuminating the paramount news stories of our time. The exhibitions prolonged absence from the capital has been a significant omission from the city's cultural calendar.



#### Entries close soon for the Event Photography Awards' 10th Anniversary

Entries close soon for the Event Photography Awards 2024, the 10<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the not-for-profit competition, which highlight the importance of photography to the sustenance of the events industry. However, get your skates on, the date has already been extended but entries will close on 14 April 2024.

There are sixteen categories to enter and twenty trophies in all, including a Best Amateur award. Furthermore, the overall winner picks up a cheque for £1,000, plus there's valuable prizes and exposure for all the category winners.

The awards event will be held at the stunning 66 Portland Place venue, the home of RIBA, on Wednesday 5 June, where over 100 short-listed shots will be on display, with all short-listed photographers given a free ticket (value £90).
